Rector Reflection

Mark 1:14-15 reads: "Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God; and saying, 'The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near, repent, and believe in the news."

This was our Gospel reading a couple Sundays ago. It is, in Mark's view, the 'mission statement' of Jesus. He came and proclaimed, in word and deed, that the time of alienation from God was over. A new time had come. Kingdom time! Repent and believe. Repenting of our sins and believing in the good news of forgiveness and reconciliation with God are at the core of what it means to be a follower of Jesus Christ. It is not that we walk around beating ourselves up for our failures. Rather, to acknowledge one's sins is a profound honesty with our imperfections as human beings. We call out to God Almighty for help and God... Oh and God, the mighty God shows up for us. Even in our faults and failures we have been given the greatest gift! God's unfailing love and faithfulness. Because of that we can repent often! If you are faithful to the Daily Office, you repent at least twice a day. To be honest, I used to find this a burden. Morning AND night? Am I really in such need? Um. Turns out the answer is yes. I am in a time in my life when I don't want to waste the time I have left pretending I have things altogether. It's too exhausting and inherently dishonest. Now I welcome the confession and absolution at the beginning of prayer because it is a moment of stripping away all pretense with God. God knows everything there is to know about each of us. Are we that transparent with ourselves? How readily do we say the words: "I am sorry. I was wrong. Please forgive me." We each can, without fear or guilt, acknowledge when we have failed AND....begin again. What a gift that is! When the well runs dry, we can come in prayer to Living Water that cleanses and refreshes our souls. I do believe such language is more than mere metaphor. It is descriptive of how God's love and forgiveness frees us. And God is not stingy about it either!

I remind you of these things because in February we enter the counter-cultural season of Lent. It is anathema to those who believe they never do wrong (at least not seriously wrong, maybe only white lies instead of bald face lies). Lent is an opportunity to face up to the patterns of thoughts, words and deeds that are selfish, prideful, harmful, cruel, or just plain indifferent toward God and our neighbors. We have the chance in Lent to repent more often! The Lenten journey helps us to approach the reality of human love and betrayal on graphic display in the liturgies of Holy Week and Easter. We intently, purposefully, and faithfully enter fasting and denial during Lent. As a priest, I am obligated to both practice it and to commend it to all. We attempt in the weeks of Lent to make sacrifices that bring us to an even deeper awareness of our need for God's grace. *Please, take this time seriously*. Repent often. Speak the name of Jesus often. Give alms. Fast from certain foods that you consume often so as to remember those for whom fasting is imposed by poverty. Practice self-denial so that others might be lifted up. Above all pray for the world and spend more time with

the Scriptures. The Holy Spirit can be trusted to speak through all our Lenten practices. Do it all without fanfare. Do it in honor of Jesus Christ. If you have not received the Sacrament of Reconciliation recently, please avail yourself of the rite sometime during Lent. After all, as baptized people we share in Jesus' mission. The Dominican Order says it like this: We are to praise, to bless and to preach that the kingdom of God is at hand and real transformation is possible!

Gloria Dei's next Who's Your Neighbor Luncheon is February 16, 2024, at 12:00 pm (noon). Lunch is free but donations are welcome.




