Rector's Reflection

*"Create a clean heart in me, O God, and renew a right spirit within me.
Cast me not away from your presence, O Lord, take not your Holy Spirit from me.
Give me the joy of your saving help again, and sustain me with your bountiful Spirit."
Psalm 51:11-13*

*"Open my lips, O Lord, and my mouth shall proclaim your praise.
Had you desired it, I would have offered sacrifice, but you take no delight in burnt offerings.
The sacrifice of God is a troubled spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise."
Psalm 51:16-18*

These beautiful verses from Psalm 51 will be read on Ash Wednesday. I always think of them as the prayer that summarizes the liturgical season of Lent, which begins on Ash Wednesday and lasts through Holy Week and ends, of course, with Easter. Listen deeply to these words. It is the cry of an overwhelmed human heart asking for healing, restoration, redemption and life. The words lean on the mercy and goodness of God and the feeling of hopelessness on the part of a human to make their life whole again without divine help. This is what Lent is about. Recognizing our sin and other ways our lives are broken and seeking God for help to make amends, to forgive those who have hurt us, to be free of bitterness, guilt and shame.

The good news of Easter starts at Christmas. It starts with God becoming flesh and living among humans to demonstrate the love and mercy that God wants all of us to receive and enjoy. Jesus' preaching ministry did two things. 1) Announce that the kingdom of God was 'at hand'. God was not far away but walking with us. 2) Jesus restored, healed, forgave, blessed, and spoke frank words filled with the opportunity for repentance and change. The response to Jesus was much like how people today respond: Many believe in him. Many thought he was crazy. Some thought he was dangerous, so much so they arranged for his death. What they did not count on was that the love of God cannot be killed! Jesus truly died and was buried. He was raised from the dead. That is the single most important reality of the Christian faith.

For many centuries this season of Lent has been kept so the people of God can reflect honestly and deeply upon the actions of God. The word became flesh. Died our own death. Buried and locked away. Rose from death. All this so you and I can follow his life and share in his resurrection. It is more than just six weeks of fasting, extra prayer and giving alms. It is a time to get right with God. Be brutally honest with ourselves and place all our trust in the goodness and love of God who came to us so that where God is we may be also. The gifts of God have been poured out. Fear not! Use the words of Psalm 51 every day in Lent. Begin your day opening your heart to the Spirit of God to show you what needs to be faced, forgiven and freed in your life. Then lean on the Spirit to help you gently and resolutely repent, turn and be fully renewed.

If during Lent you feel moved to experience the Rite of Reconciliation, which is in our Book of Common Prayer, please make an appointment with me. It is not a requirement. The Episcopal adage on the Rite of Reconciliation is "All may, none must, some should." It is a beautiful and powerful way to include in your experience of the Lenten.

Each week we're inviting you to give thanks and give back to different areas of your life as a Lenten discipline and a way to welcome Easter.

FEBRUARY 18-21

NATURE

GRATITUDE:

This week, notice and give thanks for all the signs of Spring you can find and take pictures or make a list of all of them. Be on the lookout for birds, plants, and bugs. What are your favorite ways to know that spring is coming?

FEBRUARY 22-28

RECIPROCITY:

Last week we noticed and gave thanks for Spring. This week we are going to help Spring along. Try one (or all) of these project to give back to nature:

1. make a bird feeder for the birds returning
2. clean up a garden bed or park so that it is ready for use
3. plant flowers to help welcome Spring

MARCH 1-7

FAMILY

GRATITUDE:

Let's show gratitude to the people we live with this week. Make sure to notice and say thank you to each member of your family, especially for the everyday ways they take care of you or make your life better. Try to say thank you to each person at least once a day for something you usually don't thank them for doing/being.

MARCH 8-14

RECIPROCITY:

Last week we spent a lot of time thanking the people we live with for the things they do that we are thankful for but sometimes overlook. This week, your challenge is to do something nice for them that they won't expect. Do your chores without being asked, offer to help with a task, show kindness and love to those you live with in unexpected ways.

MARCH 15-21

COMMUNITY

GRATITUDE:

Community can mean a lot of different things - it can mean the people who live in our neighborhood, or the people who work or attend school with us, or it can mean the town where we live. Each day this week pick a different community that you are a part of and write down what you are thankful for about that community, from the people in it to the things you do as a part of it.

MARCH 22-28

RECIPROCITY:

Last week we looked at the communities we are a part of. This week we are going to give back to them. Decide how you can give back to one or more of these communities. Can you donate gently loved stuffed animals and clothing, plant flowers at school, or invite your church to host a food drive? How can you make a positive impact in your communities?

MARCH 29-APRIL 4

HOLY WEEK

GRATITUDE:

During Holy Week, we journey alongside Jesus from Palm Sunday to Easter. This week, we want to invite you to give thanks for your faith. Ask someone to share the story of your baptism with you, find out why having faith is important to your family members, and share your favorite Bible story.

EASTER

RECIPROCITY:

Easter is a very exciting time, with Easter baskets, egg hunts, and celebrations. Today, while you are enjoying all of the fun ways your community celebrates Easter, see if there is a way you can contribute to the fun. Can you make sure smaller kids get eggs at the egg hunt? Can you make a special Easter card for someone? How can you make Easter special for someone else?
