Rector Reflection

For 10 years of my life, I served in the United Methodist Church. While there were many things I admired about the Methodist tradition (and still do---- John Wesley rocks!), I returned to the Episcopal Church of my youth because of the grandeur of our worship and the quietude of the Prayer Book tradition. It gives me life. But on occasion, I miss my Methodist days. One such moment occurred recently. The last hymn of the day on October 8th, two days after the Hamas attack in Israel, took me right back to my Methodist days. You see, in the Methodist church it is quite common to have a hymn as the dismissal. The last hymn on the 8th was one of the standard dismissal hymns in my Methodist days. Here are the words...I am sure you know them:

"Let there be peace on earth and let it begin with me.
Let there be peace on earth, the peace that was meant to be.
With God our Creator, children all are we.
Let us walk with each other in perfect harmony.
Let peace begin with me.
Let this be the moment now.
With every breath I take, let this be my solemn vow.
To take each moment and live each moment in peace eternally.
Let there be peace on earth, and let it begin with me."

I always loved that old song. And I loved the tradition that it was the last word of our worship on any given Sunday. In doing, so we made our last word an offering and re-commitment to living as Christians as we went out the door. It was to live out what Paul says in Romans 12:18 "If it is possible, so far as it depends upon you, live peaceably with all."

Given the overwhelming circumstances unfolding in Israel and Gaza, and really the whole middle east region, (not to mention Ukraine and other places of terror, war and violence in the world) it seems right that we should be singing this song more often. It is a reminder that to follow Christ is not an abstract commitment to a mere feeling of peace. It is hard, costly work to forgive, to reconcile and to work things out so that there is balance and equity between peoples. Such effort is, in fact, at the heart of taking up one's cross and following Jesus. The Gospel call to peacemaking (loving your neighbor as yourself) is no cake walk. Whether it be wars on a global scale or estrangement within a family or even misunderstanding between two friends, to commit to peace is the radical choice of choosing love over power. That is why we must pray for peace. We pray for transformation in ourselves as well as others so that what God wants for humanity may be welcomed in us all. It is a transformation that does not come naturally to us. We need the Holy Spirit to move in us to capture our imaginations for love's sake and take hold of the vision of a world redeemed.

Let us pray....

O God, the Holy Spirit, come to us, and among us; come as the wind, and cleanse us; come as the fire, and burn; come as the dew, and refresh; convict, convert, and consecrate our hearts and lives to our great good and to your greater glory; and this we ask for the sake of Jesus Christ our Lord. 


Coos Food Cupboard

Thank you all who attended and made the 135th Annual Meeting of the Convention happen on Saturday, October 28.


Bishop's Address:

"Stability is available to us as the fruit of spiritual practices. Through prayer—both corporate and individual— we deepen our identity in Christ. This identity has its fullness in the knowledge that, in God, we know a peace that surpasses understanding. Because of this we trust that we are perfectly safe, that all will be well even though we do not control the how and the when."

"This trust is at the center of our capacity to adapt. Adaptive change, for Christians, is fueled by trust and hope that the light of Christ within us has the power to transform lives: our own as well as others'. We build the capacity to adapt through our practices of forgiveness. One of the most important gifts God has given us is to have hearts that truly see and hear. What we learn because of this gift, is not only that we are loved beyond all understanding, but that we have the ability to hurt others and are therefore called to repair the damage we have done."

"When we do the work of confession, forgiveness, and reconciliation, we have laid the foundation to be adaptive — to understand that our transformation in Christ is always about change ... about looking up ahead to see where the light of Christ is shining ... and to follow."
