#### **Rector Reflection**

On Tuesday, May 16<sup>th</sup>, Emmanuel was blessed to host Pamela Filbert who is a volunteer historian working on the history of people of color in Coos County. Most recently she has been researching the 1924 unsolved murder of Timothy "Frank" Pettis. Pettis, an African American man, lived and worked here in Coos Bay. His body was recovered from the bay after being accused by sailors at a local cafe of having a knife. He was chased by police responding to the reports of the disturbance but mysteriously disappeared. Upon autopsy it was determined that he had been castrated and asphyxiated and dumped in the bay. There was an inquest, but no conclusion and seemingly not much effort to discover the perpetrator(s) was made.



Needless to say it was a difficult story to hear. But it is a necessary story to tell. The experience of racial bias against people of color in Coos County is a reality. We have learned two names in recent years: Alonzo Tucker and now Timothy Pettis. The point of such naming and research is not to incur shame or seek to blame and impose guilt. Rather it is to seek justice for those whose lives were cut short by acknowledging that racism is real. It is often very subtle and genteel and sometimes extremely ugly and violent. Either way, racism is a *sin*. It is an offense against God. It is a pattern of thinking and acting that diminishes another human being on false assumptions based on skin tone. It is not seeing the face of Christ in others. It is using power at your disposal. (e.g. words, attitudes, access to a way of life that others would like to enjoy but are prevented) Subtle and overt racism in thought, word and deed was a reality in the early days of Coos County. It was experienced among the African Americans, the Chinese, the Japanese and the Native peoples of the Coos and Coquille. This is what Pam reminded us all in her powerful presentation.

But the bigger and more pressing question is to consider in what ways is racism a reality now? How have our thoughts, words and deeds changed at all? In what ways do we actively diminish our neighbors whom we are commanded to love as ourselves? This is painful work. None of us wants to believe we have racist thoughts and actions as individuals. And yet the history of race relations in the world compels us to see the truth that humans throughout history have been formed to think some people are more and better humans than others. We must repent of this and turn to the Lord. We must be bold enough in our faith in Jesus Christ to acknowledge the ways in which we fall short of truly loving our neighbors and we must change our ways. The way of Christ is the way of love; genuine, authentic and substantive love. By the power of the Holy Spirit the transformation of our hearts is promised. Be not afraid.

#### **CREATE YOUR OWN MUSICAL! Summer Camp**

Children entering second through fifth grades are invited to participate in Create Your Own Musical!, a two-week music camp being held at Emmanuel Episcopal Church, June 19-30. At the Create Your Own Musical! camp, students create and perform dialogue, lyrics, music, and choreography for a short musical under the direction of camp director Kate Moody and teaching assistant, Matthew Reynolds.

Create Your Own Musical! is the brainchild of composer, pianist, and music teacher Kate Moody, who developed the Creative Method of music education when she began teaching music in 1990. The Creative Method combines traditional music strategies (reading and reproducing written notes and rhythms) with learning scales and chords and writing and improvising music with those scales and chords. Musical experience is great, but not required as all the parts are created during the camp so different experience levels can be mixed.

The camp musical will be about Harlequin, a child whose widowed parent can't buy a costume for Harlequin to wear to the village fair. The other village children each cut out a piece of their own costume so that there is enough fabric for Harlequin's costume - which turns out to be the most colorful of all!

This free camp is underwritten by a generous grant from Emmanuel Episcopal Church. Space is limited, so students must register to attend.
